
Believe

A few months later, when Wilbur and Orville Wright, bicycle mechanics from Dayton, did fly from the sand dunes in Kitty Hawk, North Carolina, the editor still refused to acknowledge it. Wilbur and Orville telegraphed their father: "Success four flights Thursday morning....inform press...home Christmas." The next day, an article was on the front of the paper. It said, "Wright brothers will be home for Christmas."

They said it couldn't happen.

He was born blind. He had always been blind. He always would be blind. But a wandering Jewish rabbi had done something to him, and now he could see. The Pharisees didn't believe it, even when they saw the man. His parents didn't want to acknowledge that their son was healed. They had all the arguments. But the man just kept saying, "Yeah, I know...but once I was blind, now I see."

A person with an experience is never at the mercy of someone with an argument.

Can you see?

Prayer: Lord, help us to believe, so that we may see. Amen.

DECEMBER 8

Scripture: John 1:1-14

The year 2025 will be the 1700th anniversary of the Nicene Creed. Historically, this creed has been, along with the Apostles Creed, among the Church's major affirmations of faith.

What is an "affirmation of faith?" It's a credo, or statement of beliefs. When asked about my beliefs, I must reply in terms of my faith. What do I believe? That is, what do I have faith in?

When faced with tragedy, one may say their faith is shaken, meaning their beliefs failed when needed. By contrast, one may say they overcame difficulty only because of their faith. Their beliefs made the difference.

What do I have faith in? This list includes my wife, family, friends, and church. Theologically, I believe in Christ as the way by which I try to live. It is through him that I seek strength for daily life. His love is the standard for how I try to treat other people. This faith describes my core beliefs. Do I sometimes fall short in practicing what I believe? Sadly, yes. However, I also believe in God's forgiving grace. Therefore, I ask for forgiveness—often! "Amazing grace, how sweet the sound!"

As part of my personal beliefs, I experience another Advent season, confident in the faith that in Christ, God became flesh, "full of grace and truth."

Prayer: God, lead me to deepen my faith and strengthen my beliefs, that I may better serve you in all I do. Amen.

Prayer Acrostics

Scripture: Matthew 6:5-8

I appreciate memory aids, devices that help me recall useful words or thoughts. I especially like acrostics that assist me to focus my thoughts during prayer. I attempt to use Advent as a time to renew focus on my prayer life, one of reflection and preparation for the celebration of Christ's coming.

There are several prayer acrostics that have been useful to me throughout my life. One such memory aid, of which you may be familiar is ACTS. ACTS represents Adoration (praise of God), Confession (acknowledge and repent of sins you have committed), Thanksgiving (thank God for how he has blessed you and others), and Supplication (pray for your needs and the needs of others). I do not know the origin of this helpful memory aide and do not know who deserves credit for its creation, but I have found it useful.

For many years now, I have been using PPIR (I pronounce as "purr."), my own acrostic creation, to assist in focusing my prayers. P represents praise and thanksgiving, the other P is for penance, I stands for intercession, and R is for requests. I see praise for God and thanksgiving being closely related, exulting the Father, Son, and Holy Ghost, and being thankful for all that has been bestowed on me. A contrite plea for forgiveness is important. Focus on intercession for others, then close the prayer in making requests for self. Praise God and be thankful, seek forgiveness for your indiscretions, offer requests for others, and lastly, think of self.

Prayer: Oh God, I praise your name, and I am thankful for your grace every day. Forgive me my transgressions. May you be revealed to nonbelievers and assist me daily to focus on faithful living. Amen.

Do You Hear What I Hear?

DECEMBER 13

Scripture: Luke 2:8-20

The first Christmas decoration I get out of the attic is a crèche. Growing up in church, playing the part of a shepherd boy or a magi, my eyes were always fixed on the manger where Jesus was born. It is where I first believed. Later, when I visited the place of Jesus' birth in Bethlehem, the scene wasn't as I pictured it in a cow barn and a feeding trough. Yet, still it was awe-inspiring. Luke tells us that after the shepherds had visited the place of Jesus' birth, they "returned glorifying and praising God for all they had heard and seen, just as it had been told them." Like them, this is the story I like to tell. The Christian faith is always just one generation away from extinction unless we tell our stories. No one is "born" a Christian. Christians can only be "born anew" after they hear God's story and make it their story. Each



new generation of Christians must pass on the story to the next, or Christianity will become something learned from history books but no longer lived out in a life of faith. It was at the manger that I first believed, and still today joyfully share this world-transforming event of our Savior's birth with everyone I meet. Do you hear what I hear?

Prayer: Loving God, we offer our thanks for the gift of love born to us at Christmas. Like the shepherds, let us approach the manger with wonder and awe. Amen.

Don't Speak Your Belief; Show It

Scripture: James 2:26

The gift of faith is an incredible thing, and having the ability and willingness to talk about it is equally powerful. But there's something even greater than that: *showing your faith in action*. In my life it's not been enough for me to talk about my belief that the hungry should be fed. I've gone a step further and volunteered at food pantries. Saying that I believe the homeless should be provided shelter isn't sufficient. I've taken time to work with others volunteering in a warehouse that provides furniture for those moving off the streets and into stable housing.

The writer of the Epistle of James isn't discounting the importance of faith. Faith-belief-is vital. What is being shown is that faith is only one side of the coin; flip it to the other side and you find works. I try

to live my life demonstrating that it's not enough simply to *share* the good news. You must *show* the good news. Your words have an impact on those looking to you as an example, but your actions will speak with far more power.

Prayer: Gracious God, grant me the words to express my belief and opportunities to live it. Grant me the wisdom and courage to go beyond

simply professing faith,
empowering me to put
what I carry in my mind and
heart to work through my
hands and feet. Let what
I demonstrate through my
actions be proof to others of my
belief in you. Amen.

Scripture: 1 Corinthians 16:13




